This term we have had a very informative visit from the LGBTQ+ Project. Established in 2007, the project provides early intervention and prevention support, services, and information to all age groups to help empower individuals to improve



their mental and emotional wellbeing and to reduce social isolation of LGBTQ+ individuals. The talk was a great way to spark conversation amongst the children about LGBTQ+ and answer all questions surrounding this topic. The children participated really well and we will continue these discussions next term in PSHE.
